



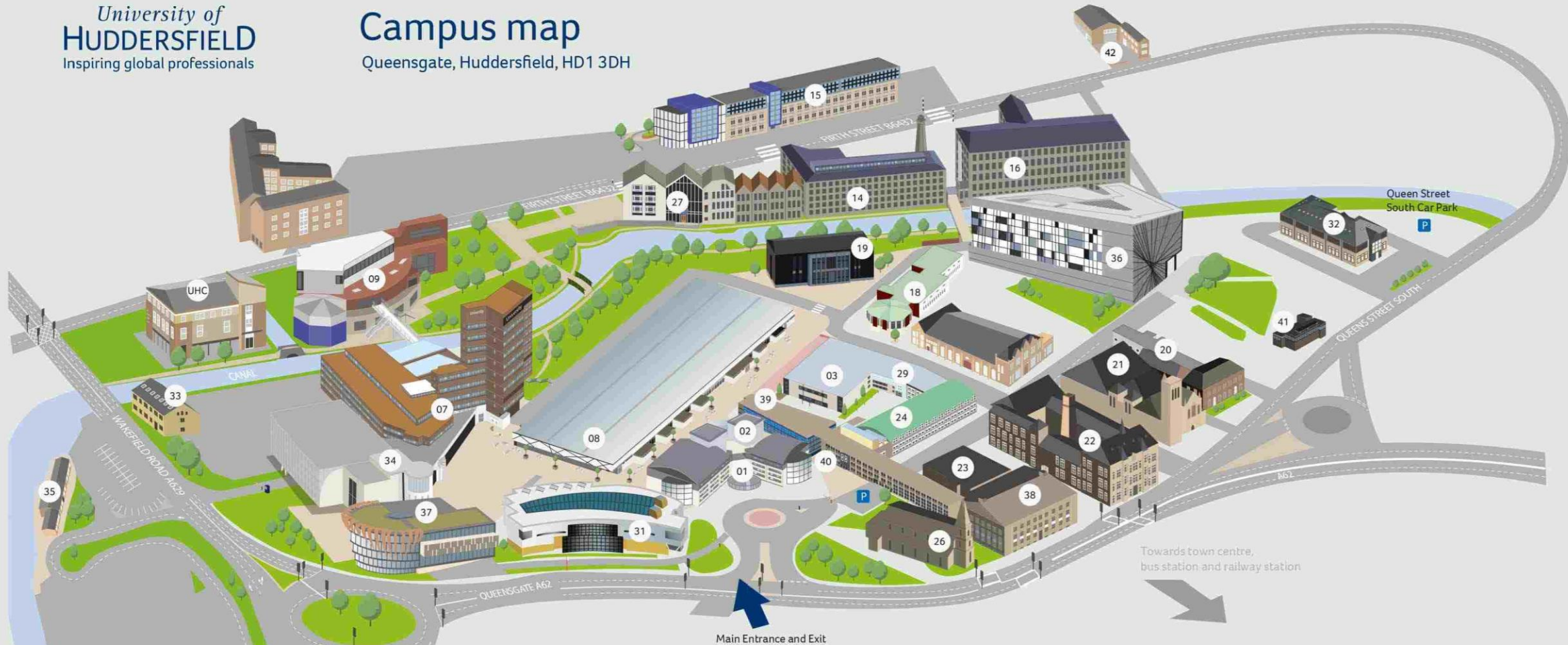

Harold Wilson Café/Social Areas

The Harold Wilson building may become busy at times, but is often much quieter than Oastler or Student Central. It has seating areas in the main area of each floor, which are especially quiet later in the day. In addition, the café offers a quiet place to socialise or spend lunchbreaks.

Sparck Jones Café Area

Sparck Jones is a fairly quiet building with warm lighting and a place to sit without high noise levels. As the café is closed, footfall is even more reduced, so is an ideal place to spend a quiet break between teaching.

Oastler Study Spaces

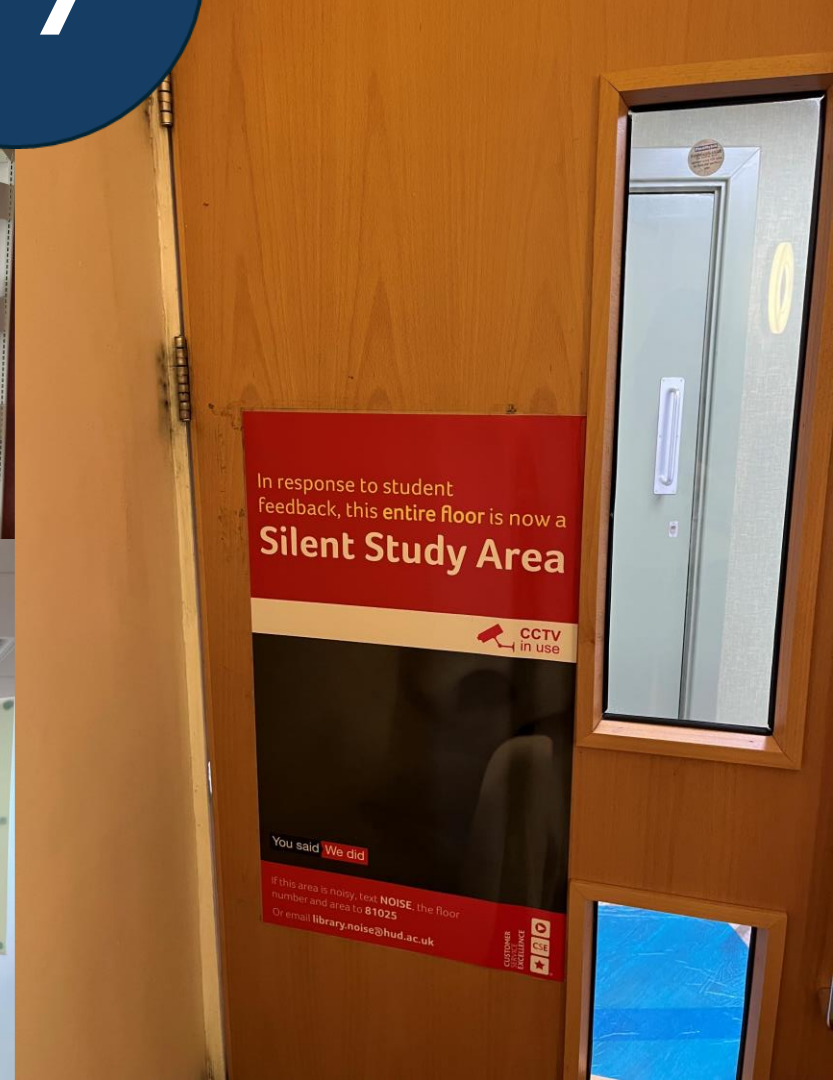
Oastler can be a relatively busy building during peak teaching time, but we also understand that students may want to find study spaces that are close to their next lecture or teaching session. Oastler offers a silent study zone on Floor 7, where students can sit in the natural lighting, out of the way of the main walkway, to complete work or spend downtime.



Calm Spaces in the Library

The library generally offers a quiet area for students to complete work in a controlled environment. However, the library team have recently opened a 'Calm Zone', with the sole purpose of giving students a space to chill in a sensory-friendly environment. This space is within a silent study area, meaning the noise levels are calm, but the space itself is intended to be a 'study-free' area, giving students an opportunity to rest. There is a selection of comfortable seating and books to read, and the space is open to whoever may want to use it.



Quiet(ish) Building – Richard Steinitz

The Richard Steinitz Building is one of the quieter buildings on the main campus. Extremely close to Oastler and Schwann building, this may be a good choice for students who want to stay close but move away from the hustle and bustle of those busier buildings. It does not have a designated social area, but there are sets of chairs dotted around each floor and the building itself is in peaceful natural lighting from the large windows.

Daphne Steele Study Space

For our students who have teaching sessions over on the Southgate campus, Daphne Steele has peaceful spots that are a little more out of the way of main areas. On the ground floor to the side of the iPoint desk, you can go through double doors into a more secluded study space. This space is often much quieter than the main study area, but still provides students with access to computers and study resources that are on offer in the main library.



Daphne Steele Study Space/Prayer Space

On the fourth floor, you can find the Study/Prayer Space, which is entirely open to student use. The room is behind a door, unlike the main study spaces, but still offers computer booths for quiet working. As the space is also available for students to pray, a sign can be placed on the door for privacy.



Outdoor Spaces

Our campus also has lots of little areas to grab some fresh air, but if you're looking for ones that are a little quieter, then the outside benches beside the canal are great. You can find these on the opposite side of the canal to the Lockside building.

Another quieter location would be the terraced patio outside the Schwann building. This has benches and overlooks the canal and Charles Sikes Building.
