Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.0

Principle 1: Perceivable

Information and user interface components must be presentable to users in ways they can perceive.

Guideline 1.1 Text Alternatives

Provide text alternatives for any non-text content so that it can be changed into other forms people need, such as large print, braille, speech, symbols or simpler language.

1.1.1 Non-text Content: All non-text content that is presented to the user has a text alternative that serves the equivalent purpose, except in situations listed in WCAG 2.0 1.1.1 .	Supported	

Guideline 1.2 Time-based Media

Provide alternatives for time-based media.

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
1.2.1 Audio-only and Video-only (Prerecorded): For prerecorded audio-only and prerecorded video-only media, the following are true, except when the audio or video is a media alternative for text and is clearly labeled as such: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• <u>Prerecorded Audio-only</u>: An alternative for time-based media is provided that presents equivalent information for prerecorded audio-only content.• <u>Prerecorded Video-only</u>: Either an alternative for time-based media or an audio track is provided that presents equivalent information for prerecorded video-only content. 1.2.2 Captions (Prerecorded): Captions are provided for all prerecorded audio content in synchronized media, except when the media is a media alternative for text and is clearly labeled as such.	Not Applicable

Guideline 1.3 Adaptable

Create content that can be presented in different ways (for example simpler layout) without losing information or structure.

<p>1.3.1 Info and Relationships: Information, structure, and relationships conveyed through presentation can be programmatically determined or are available in text.</p>	Supported With Exceptions	<p>Assistive technologies can access equations and provide descriptive text output, but may omit some information about equation font formatting or the existence of comments. Some advanced features of AT may be impacted while accessing equations, such as verbosity controls or output to Braille.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In systems configured for Right-to-Left languages with VoiceOver enabled, the focus rectangle information provided to VoiceOver may not correspond with the active page content. • When an image is resized using the resize menu, the updated image width and height is not announced by VoiceOver. • When an image is resized using the image resize handles, the updated image width or height is announced by VoiceOver only for the value associated with the handle that was used, not for other values that may have been impacted by the resize action. • When VoiceOver is narrating content in word-by-word mode, when narrating a paragraph that includes a hyperlink, the text following the hyperlink is not narrated correctly. • When a Style is applied to text in OneNote the appearance and formatting defined in the Style is applied to the text. Although some Styles have names suggesting document structure, such as "Heading 1" or "Heading 2", those Styles are not presented to VoiceOver as structural elements supporting heading navigation.

Guideline 1.4 Distinguishable

Make it easier for users to see and hear content including separating foreground from background.

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
1.4.1 Use of Color: Color is not used as the only visual means of conveying information, indicating an action, prompting a response, or distinguishing a visual element.	Supported	
1.4.2 Audio Control: If any audio on a Web page plays automatically for more than 3 seconds, either a mechanism is available to pause or stop the audio, or a mechanism is available to control audio volume independently from the overall system volume level.	Not Applicable	
1.4.3 Contrast (Minimum): The visual presentation of text and images of text has a contrast ratio of at least 4.5:1, except for the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <u>Large Text:</u> Large-scale text and images of large-scale text have a contrast ratio of at least 3:1; • <u>Incidental:</u> Text or images of text that are part of an inactive user interface component, that are pure decoration, that are not visible to anyone, or that are part of a picture that contains significant other visual content, have no contrast requirement. 1.4.4 Resize text: Except for captions and images of text, text can be resized without assistive technology up to 200 percent without loss of content or functionality.	Supported	
1.4.5 Images of Text: If the technologies being used can achieve the visual presentation, text is used to convey information rather than images of text except for the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <u>Customizable</u>: The image of text can be visually customized to the user's requirements; • <u>Essential</u>: A particular presentation of text is essential to the information being conveyed. 	Supported	

Principle 2: Operable

User interface components and navigation must be operable.

Guideline 2.1 Keyboard Accessible

Make all functionality available from a keyboard.

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
2.1.1 Keyboard: All functionality of the content is operable through a keyboard interface without requiring specific timings for individual keystrokes, except where the underlying function requires input that depends on the path of the user's movement and not just the endpoints.	Supported With Exceptions	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Ink authoring requires a pen, touch, or mouse input. It is not keyboard accessible. - The handles for adjusting some attributes of shapes cannot be adjusted using a keyboard. - Users cannot swipe right or use Ctrl+Alt+Arrow to create content on the new page. Instead, they must press Enter. - The Play button for embedded videos is not accessible using VoiceOver with keyboard. - Newly created table cells cannot be accessed using VoiceOver. To access the table with a keyboard, user will need to change the active page and then return to the page again.

2.1.2 No Keyboard Trap: If keyboard focus can be moved to a component of the page using a keyboard interface, then focus can be moved away from that component using only a keyboard interface, and, if it requires more than unmodified arrow or tab keys or other standard exit methods, the user is advised of the method for moving focus away. Guideline 2.2 Enough Time

Provide users enough time to read and use content.

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
2.2.1 Timing Adjustable: For each time limit that is set by the content, at least one of the following is true: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <u>Turn off:</u> User is allowed to turn off time limit before encountering it; or • <u>Adjust:</u> The user is allowed to adjust the time limit before encountering it over a wide range that is at least ten times the length of the default setting; or • <u>Extend:</u> The user is warned before time expires and given at least 20 seconds to extend the time limit with a simple action (for example, "press the space bar"), and the user is allowed to extend the time limit at least ten times; or • <u>Real-time Exception:</u> The time limit is a required part of a real-time event (for example, an auction), and no alternative to the time limit is possible; or • <u>Essential Exception:</u> The time limit is essential and extending it would invalidate the activity; or • <u>20 Hour Exception:</u> The time limit is longer than 20 hours. 2.2.2 Pause, Stop, Hide: For moving, blinking, scrolling, or auto-updating information, all of the following are true:	Supported	

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <u>Moving, blinking, scrolling</u>: For any moving, blinking or scrolling information that (1) starts automatically, (2) lasts more than five seconds, and (3) is presented in parallel with other content, there is a mechanism for the user to pause, stop, or hide it unless the movement, blinking, or scrolling is part of an activity where it is essential; and • <u>Auto-updating</u>: For any auto-updating information that (1) starts automatically and (2) is presented in parallel with other content, there is a mechanism for the user to pause, stop, or hide it or to control the frequency of the update unless the auto-updating is part of an activity where it is essential. 		

Guideline 2.3 Seizures

Do not design content in a way that is known to cause seizures.

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
2.3.1 Three Flashes or Below Threshold: Web pages do not contain anything that flashes more than three times in any one second period, or the flash is below the general flash and red flash thresholds.	Supported	

Guideline 2.4 Navigable

Provide ways to help users navigate, find content, and determine where they are.

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
2.4.1 Bypass Blocks: A mechanism is available to bypass blocks of content that are repeated on multiple Web pages.	Supported	
2.4.2 Page Titled: Web pages have titles that describe topic or purpose.	Supported	

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
2.4.3 Focus Order: If a Web page can be navigated sequentially and the navigation sequences affect meaning or operation, focusable components receive focus in an order that preserves meaning and operability.	Supported With Exceptions	In List View, after indenting a list item, focus does not go to all items in the list. The user can work around this by exiting and returning to the list.
2.4.4 Link Purpose (In Context): The purpose of each link can be determined from the link text alone or from the link text together with its programmatically determined link context, except where the purpose of the link would be ambiguous to users in general.	Supported	
2.4.5 Multiple Ways: More than one way is available to locate a Web page within a set of Web pages except where the Web Page is the result of, or a step in, a process.	Supported	
2.4.6 Headings and Labels: Headings and labels describe topic or purpose.	Supported With Exceptions	Text Headings are not announced as 'Headings' in VoiceOver.
2.4.7 Focus Visible: Any keyboard operable user interface has a mode of operation where the keyboard focus indicator is visible.	Supported	

Principle 3: Understandable

Information and the operation of user interface must be understandable.

Guideline 3.1 Readable

Make text content readable and understandable.

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
3.1.1 Language of Page: The default human language of each Web page can be programmatically determined.	Supported	
3.1.2 Language of Parts: The human language of each passage or phrase in the content can be programmatically determined except for proper names, technical terms, words of indeterminate language, and words or phrases that have	Supported

Guideline 3.2 Predictable

Make Web pages appear and operate in predictable ways.

Criteria	Supporting Feature	Remarks and Explanations
3.2.1 On Focus: When any component receives focus, it does not initiate a change of context.	Supported	
3.2.2 On Input: Changing the setting of any user interface component does not automatically cause a change of context unless the user has been advised of the behavior before using the component	Supported	
3.2.3 Consistent Navigation: Navigational mechanisms that are repeated on multiple Web pages within a set of Web pages occur in the same relative order each time they are repeated, unless a change is initiated by the user.	Supported	
3.2.4 Consistent Identification: Components that have the same functionality within a set of Web pages are identified consistently.	Supported	

Guideline 3.3 Input Assistance

Help users avoid and correct mistakes.

3.3.1 Error Identification: If an input error is automatically detected, the item that is in error is identified and the error is described to the user in text.	Supported	
3.3.2 Labels or Instructions: Labels or instructions are provided when content requires user input.	Supported

3.3.4 Error Prevention (Legal, Financial, Data): For Web pages that cause legal commitments or financial transactions for the user to occur, that modify or delete user-controllable data in data storage systems, or that submit user test responses, at least one of the following is true: 1. Reversible: Submissions are reversible. 2. Checked: Data entered by the user is checked for input errors and the user is provided an opportunity to correct them. 3. Confirmed: A mechanism is available for reviewing, confirming, and correcting information before finalizing the submission.	Not Applicable	

Principle 4: Robust

Content must be robust enough that it can be interpreted reliably by a wide variety of user agents, including assistive technologies.

Guideline 4.1 Compatible

Maximize compatibility with current and future user agents, including assistive technologies.

4.1.1 Parsing: In content implemented using markup languages, elements have complete start and end tags, elements are nested according to their specifications, elements do not contain duplicate attributes, and any IDs are unique, except where the specifications allow these features.	Supported

As a result, VoiceOver narrates the existence and state of the check box at a different point in the document than the associated text.

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
